

# Ted Delahunty Agribusiness Bursary

## Bursary Regulations

### **Focus**

Agribusiness

### **Level of Study**

Undergraduate

### **Purpose**

The purpose of this bursary is to financially support deserving agribusiness students.

### **Background**

The Ted Delahunty Agribusiness Bursary was established by the Ted Delahunty Trust. Mr Delahunty was a senior lecturer in Massey University's School of Accounting and Finance from 1978 to 1986. On his retirement, he established the Ted Delahunty Trust to provide education and research into accounting and other business activities for the land-based primary industry. He died in 2015.

### **Value and Tenure**

The value of the bursary is \$10,000 per annum for full-time students; prorated for part-time students. The bursary is awarded annually and the tenure is a single academic year.

### **Typical Number on Offer**

Typically, one bursary is awarded each year.

### **Eligibility**

Applicants must be:

- New Zealand citizens or permanent residents
- enrolled full time or part time in the final year of study in the Bachelor of Agribusiness, internally on the Manawatū campus

## **Selection Criteria**

The selection criteria are academic merit and financial hardship.

Financial hardship is assessed through an income and expense budget submitted by the applicant.

Evidence of good citizenship may also be taken into account such as character references and community involvement.

## **Selection Panel**

The bursary is awarded by the University Scholarships Committee on the recommendation of a selection panel consisting of Head of School of Agriculture and Environment or nominee, a Trustee of the Delahunty Trust, and one School of Agriculture and Environment staff member.

The selection panel has the right to refrain from making an award if there are no suitable applicants and its decision is final.

## **Conditions of the Bursary**

The bursary is paid in two instalments. For part-time students the payments are prorated.

The scholarship may be held in conjunction with other scholarships, bursaries or awards, so long as those scholarships, bursaries or awards permit co-tenure.
